The public hearing will cover the proposed 2011, 2012, 2013, 2014, and 2015 rate adjustments for water service. This Notice has been sent to all property owners within the City of Portola and outside of the City where the City provides water service. If adopted, the proposed rate adjustments will become effective for bills issued on or after July 1, 2011 and for bills issued on or after July 1, 2012, 2013, 2014, and 2015.

This Notice of Public Hearing provides information regarding the proposed rate adjustments to property owners within the City of Portola and outside of the City where the City provides water service pursuant to the requirements of California Constitution Article XIII D Section 6 (commonly referred to as Proposition 218). The proposed rate adjustments will be presented to the City Council for adoption on May 11, 2011, at 7:00 p.m. in the Council Chambers. This Notice also provides information on how rates are calculated, the reasons for the required rate adjustments, how customers can receive more information on the effect of the proposed rate adjustments on their water bill and how to file a protest against the proposed rate adjustments.

The City recently completed a comprehensive rate study and annually prepares an analysis of the revenues and expenditures for the water enterprise to ensure sufficient revenues are collected to effectively provide for the short and long-term water service needs of the community. Revenues received from water charges are restricted solely for the water enterprise.

HOW WATER RATES ARE CALCULATED:

Multi-Year Rate Setting Strategy -The rate study that was conducted includes a five-year look ahead at operating and capital program costs in order to forecast the necessary funds for upcoming expenses and avoid significant and unexpected increases in rates. To achieve planned service goals, incremental rate increases over a number of vears are the preferred method for ensuring rate stability. Table 1 of this Notice shows the proposed rates.

Rates Based on Customer Usage Choices - Under the City's water rate structure, bills are based on customer usage choices and resulting demand on the water system. The City has a two component water rate - a minimum base charge and a consumption rate based on the volume of water used.

Service Availability Charge - A service availability charge has been developed that reflects the cost of maintaining the water system regardless of the customer's use of the system (e.g. water consumption). This charge reflects the fixed costs of maintaining the system so that when the customer returns the service is available and ready for use.

WATER DEPARTMENT:

Keeping costs down is one of our main concerns, especially during these difficult economic times. Water operations are an independent enterprise (business activity) within the City. Water department expenditures and revenues must balance while providing our customers with a high level of service and quality drinking water.

Operational costs, such as electricity for wells and the water treatment plant, fuel for vehicles and chemical costs have increased. The ever increasing requirements from the State of California add yet additional costs. Though at times the new requirements seem onerous, they are all ultimately intended to protect the water quality for our customers.

How Do I Calculate My New Water Rates

Basis of Proposed Rates: The proposed rates were designed to fairly and equitably recover the cost of providing water service from all customer classes. The cost of providing service will be recovered through a fixed fee, called the monthly meter charge and through a variable charge, called a consumption rate that will apply to the amount of water you consume each billing cycle (month). The monthly meter charge is determined by each customer's actual meter size.

Estimating Your New Water Bill

The fixed fee (called a monthly meter charge) and the consumption rate, that will apply to the amount of water you consume, may be estimated as follows:

Step 1: Find your monthly meter charge - Your water meter size will determine your monthly meter charge. Table 1, located above, shows the proposed monthly meter charge for each meter size. Most residential meters are 5/8".

Step 2: Determine your level of consumption - You can find this information in your most recent water bill in the usage column. The proposed consumption rates are listed at the top of Table 1 located above.

Step 3: Estimate your new water bill - To calculate how much your new water bill will be, add your monthly meter charge to your consumption rate (which is the number of units of water you consume multiplied by the per unit consumption rate).

The sample calculation on the right is for a single family home with a 5/8" meter and 8 units of consumption. Your monthly water bill will vary, depending on the number of units consumed and recorded on your meter each month.

Estimating Your New Water Bill

Sample calculation using rates effective July 1, 2011

Step 1: Monthly Meter Charge

From the proposed water rate table above, determine the monthly meter charge

5/8" meter = \$18.75/month

Step 2: Consumption Rate

Assuming this customer uses 8 units of water each month

8 units @ \$2.80 per unit \$22.40/month

Step 3: Estimate your new bill

Monthly service charge: \$18.75
Consumption charge: \$22.40
Projected new bill: \$41.15

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the City Council of the City of Santa Barbara will consider a recommendation to adopt a resolution, at the above-indicated time and place, to increase water, wastewater (sewer), and solid waste collection rates charged by the City. Increases would be effective on utility bills dated July 1, 2009 or later. Sample billing comparisons for current and proposed rates are shown on the reverse.

Water Rates (Applicable only to customers billed by the City for water service)

The proposed water rate increase is three and one-half percent (3.5%) of quantity charges and monthly service charges for all customer classes. Small variations above or below the 3.5% amount may occur due to rounding. The monthly bill for the average in-City single family residential customer (twelve hundred cubic feet of water) would increase from \$59.31 to \$61.39 under the proposed rates. Buy-in fees for new construction are proposed to increase as shown on the reverse. The proposed increase will fund increasing water system costs resulting from inflation, increased treatment costs caused by changes to water quality from the Zaca fire, stricter water quality regulations, and the ongoing need to repair and upgrade the water system, including rehabilitation of the City's Ortega Groundwater Treatment Plant and improvements at Cater Water Treatment Plant.

<u>Wastewater Rates</u> (Applicable only to customers billed by the City for sewer service)

The proposed wastewater rate increase is four percent (4%) of the City's current charges for all customer classes. Small variations above or below the 4% amount may occur due to rounding. The maximum monthly charge for a single family residential customer would increase from \$31.67 to \$32.93 under the proposed rates. Buy-in fees for new construction are proposed to increase as shown on the reverse. The proposed increase will fund increasing wastewater system costs resulting from inflation and the ongoing need for rehabilitation of the City's wastewater treatment plant and collection system.

Solid Waste Rates (Applicable only to customers billed by the City for solid waste collection)

The City proposes to increase rates for solid waste collection by up to 1.2% for all customers receiving collection services from franchised haulers within the City limits. The increase is needed in order to meet the City's contractual obligation to compensate the haulers for changes in the cost of doing business. Basic residential service (one trash can) would increase from \$25.76 to \$26.08 under the proposed rates. Residential service would continue to include up to 32 gallons of free collection for greenwaste and up to 95 gallons of free collection for mixed recycling.

Note: This notice is intended only for customers billed by the City of Santa Barbara for water, wastewater, and/or solid waste collection services. Please disregard this notice with regard to any services billed to you by other agencies. Sample charges are shown on the reverse. You are receiving this notice because you are either a City of Santa Rosa water, recycled water and/or wastewater customer or you own property that is receiving City water, recycled water and/or wastewater service. The City Council will be considering a recommendation from the Board of Public Utilities to adopt increases to the water, recycled water and wastewater service charges at a public hearing on Tuesday, December 6, 2011 at the Santa Rosa City Council Chamber, 100 Santa Rosa Avenue. The hearing will start at 5:00 PM or after. The new service charges, if adopted, will go into effect on or after January 14, 2012.

The City's Water, Recycled Water and Wastewater Utilities

The City of Santa Rosa provides water services to over 50,000 residential, commercial, industrial and irrigation customers. The City provides approximately 7 billion gallons of water per year and maintains over 620 miles of water pipelines, 6,500 fire hydrants, and 22 storage tanks. The City provides wastewater services to approximately 45,000 customers, maintaining over 580 miles of sewer mains and 19 wastewater lift stations. In addition, the City owns and operates the Subregional Water Reuse System, providing wastewater treatment, disposal and reuse for more than 225,000 people in Santa Rosa, Cotati, Rohnert Park, Sebastopol and South Park Sanitation District. The City's share of the costs to run the Subregional Water Reuse System is approximately 75%, with the other four user agencies contributing the remaining 25%. The Subregional Water Reuse System is one of the largest water recyclers in the state, reusing between 90-100% of the recycled water it produces annually for urban irrigation, agricultural irrigation and to recharge the Geysers steam fields to produce energy.

How are the City's utilities funded?

The City's utilities are enterprises, supported by water, recycled water and wastewater service charges and fees. Service charges and fees for service are used to pay for the ongoing operation, maintenance, repair and replacement of existing water, recycled water and wastewater systems. Costs associated with growth and serving new development are paid for from connection or demand fees. This public notice and the public hearing will only cover proposed increases in water, recycled water and wastewater service charges.

How has the City Utilities Department cut costs?

Santa Rosa continues to make every effort to keep costs down while maintaining the high level of service that customers have come to expect. The 2011/2012 Utilities Department budget is less than any Utilities Department budget since fiscal year 2005/06. Over the past few years, the City has worked with employees to reduce labor costs and the Utilities Department has acted to significantly reduce expenses by eliminating positions and reducing operating costs. For the most recent budget for Fiscal Year 2011/2012, the Utilities Department reduced the budget for water by 8.9%, for wastewater by 2.8%, and for the Subregional Water Reuse System by 3.9%.

Reasons for the Proposed Service Charge Increases

Service charge increases are necessary to cover the rising cost of services and supplies, as well as to comply with new, unfunded regulations requiring retrofits and upgrades to existing facilities. There are several reasons for the proposed service charge increase:

- Capital improvement projects to repair/replace and maintain aging water and sewer infrastructure
- New construction projects to meet existing customers' storage and fire flow needs
- · Restoration of water fund reserves that have been drawn down due to the economic recession
- Increasing rate revenue stability by re-balancing the water fixed monthly charge
- Costs associated with new required environmental regulations

How would the service charges change?

Service charges are comprised of two components: 1) a user charge based on the amount of water used or wastewater flow generated each billing period, and 2) a fixed monthly charge based on customer meter size. The City is proposing the following increases to user charges and fixed monthly charges for water, recycled water and wastewater for 2012 and 2013:

- 2012 1% increase for the water and recycled water user charges, an 18% increase (\$1.50 per month for the average single-family residential customer) for the water and recycled water fixed monthly charges, and a 3% increase for both the wastewater fixed monthly charges and user charges.
- 2013 1% increase for the water and recycled water user charges, a 15.2% increase (\$1.50 per month for the average single-family residential customer) for the water and recycled water fixed monthly charges, and a 3% increase for both the wastewater fixed monthly charges and user charges.

Water, Recycled Water and Wastewater Rate Structures

Santa Rosa has a rate structure that encourages water conservation. Customers are charged a fixed monthly charge based on meter size and a user charge based on usage, per thousand gallons, for each billing period. The following details the rate structure for each type of customer:

- Single-Family Residential (SFR) customers are charged a water fixed monthly charge based on meter size and a user charge based on a four tiered water rate structure that encourages water conservation. In addition to the water fixed monthly charge, SFR customers that have water-only accounts (accounts with no City-provided wastewater service) that use City water for both indoor and irrigation uses are assigned a water cap and charged a user charge based on a four tiered water rate structure. The water cap is calculated by averaging usage during winter billing periods occurring during the months of November through March. In addition to the water fixed monthly charge, SFR customers with no sewer cap due to an absence of irrigation usage have all water billed at the Tier 1 user charge.
 - SFR customers are charged a wastewater fixed monthly charge based on meter size and a wastewater user charge based on calculated wastewater use as defined by the sewer cap (see below).
- Sewer Cap is determined based on indoor water usage, this is calculated by averaging usage during winter billing periods
 occurring during the months of November through March. During any billing period, if water usage is less than the sewer
 cap, accounts are charged wastewater user charges on the basis of actual water usage (the lesser amount).
- Multi-family/Industrial/Commercial customers are charged a water fixed monthly charge based on meter size and a user charge based on a uniform rate. Multi-family/Industrial/Commercial customers are charged a wastewater fixed monthly charge based on meter size and a wastewater user charge based on calculated wastewater use as defined by the sewer cap (see above).
- Dedicated Irrigation Accounts have a meter used only for irrigation and are charged a water fixed monthly charge based on meter size and a user charge based on site-specific billing period water budgets determined for each billing period in arrears.
- Recycled Water customers use recycled water for irrigation or other eligible uses and are charged a recycled water fixed
 monthly charge based on meter size and recycled water user charges based on site-specific billing period water budgets
 determined for each billing period in arrears.
- **Billing Period Water Budget** is the amount of water that the landscape needed during the billing period and is determined by using the site's square footage measurements for the type of landscape and the evapotranspiration rate.

Other Pertinent Rate-Related Changes - Minimum Sewer Charge

Pursuant to City Code Section 15-20.040(C), the City has the authority to set a minimum sewer user charge. The minimum sewer user charge will be set at 1,000 gallons per month or a sewer cap of 1.0. During any billing period, if water usage is less than 1,000 gallons, accounts will not be billed user charges.

Estimating Your Utility Bill

An average single-family residential customer having a sewer cap of 4,000 gallons and using 7,000 gallons of water per billing period will see his/her bill increase by \$3.81 per bill in 2012. However, every customer's usage is unique and each customer's bill will vary. You can estimate how the proposed service charges will affect your utilities bill in 2012 by using the formulas below. You will need a copy of a recent utility bill. From your utility bill, locate your fixed monthly charge determined by your meter size (most single-family residential accounts have a 5/8" meter), your sewer cap, and the amount of water that you use in each tier. Use the information from your bill and the amounts from the tables on the next page with the equations below:

Proposed Single Family Residential Water Charges:

2012 Single Family Residential Calculation Example: $\$9.85 + (4 \times \$4.55) + (3 \times \$5.24) = \43.77 (Est. monthly water bill)

This example is based on a 5/8" meter, sewer cap of 4,000 gallons (or 4.0), and 7,000 gallons of water usage

Proposed Sewer Charges:

2012 Sewer Calculation Example: \$19.57 + (4 x \$12.00) = \$67.57 (Est. monthly sewer bill)

This example is based on a 5/8" meter and 4,000 gallons of sewer usage



All owners and tenants of property receiving water, recycled water and/or wastewater service, all City water, recycled water and/or wastewater customers, and interested persons are invited to attend the Public Hearing and be heard about proposed increases to the service charges for water, recycled water and wastewater service. Looking for a reason to dine out?

Eating at your favorite Carmel restaurant will help keep CAWD fees in check after we install a new Receiving Station in February 2011. The station will accept dropoffs from haulers who transport discarded oil and fats from local restaurants for recycling.

Currently our microfurbines save about \$36,000 each year in energy costs by recapturing methane gas, a plant by-product. Adding more oil and grease to our digester will increase gas production, saving an additional \$7,200 annually on our PG&E bill.

In addition, haulers will pay a per gallon tipping fee to CAWD, generating \$76,000 in new revenue each year. This is just one example of how we continually strive to reduce costs and maximize plant operation.

On June 24, 2010, at 9:30 a.m., or as soon thereafter as the matter may be taken up, the Carmel Area Wastewater District (CAWD) Board of Directors will hold a public hearing prior to the adoption of its sewer rates. The hearing will be held at the District Offices located at 3945 Rio Road, Carmel, CA 93922.

Carmel Area Wastewater District is a self-supporting entity—we depend upon sewer rates and charges to fund the operating and maintenance costs of the

wastewater treatment plant and collection system. Sewer rates are established each year effective July 1. The District utilizes a rate model devised by the State Water Resources Control Board that allocates costs based on flow, biochemical oxygen demand, and suspended solids across designated customer categories. The table set forth below details the proposed rate increase for each customer category. By a significant margin, the largest customer category in our service area is residential. The rate increase we propose for residential customers is equivalent in dollar terms to an increase of \$1.39 per month in fiscal year 2010-11 and \$1.46 per month in fiscal year 2011-12.

The primary reasons we need to increase rates is because of cost hikes that other vendors pass along to us, coupled with a loss of interest and investment income due to the current economic downturn. We must absorb constant price increases for hauling services, commodity products, power and water. While we vigilantly track cost-effectiveness and implement money-saving alternatives whenever possible, there simply are no substitutes on the market for many of the chemicals we need to transform wastewater into clean water that can be safely discharged into the environment. Please see the article on page one of our accompanying newsletter for more budget details.

The procedural requirements of Proposition 218 require that the District provide a notice of the proposed rate schedule to all property owners of record forty-five (45) days prior to holding a public hearing. In order for the increase to "not take effect," a majority of the property owners are required to file opposition to the increase.

Property owners may file a written and signed protest against the proposed increase with the Board of Directors of Carmel Area Wastewater District (CAWD) at or before the close of the public hearing. To be valid, a protest must be in writing even if you plan to attend the public hearing. E-mail protests cannot be formally considered. Each written protest must include the parcel owner's name, service address, assessor's parcel number for the parcel served, and the parcel owner's signature. Only one protest will be counted per parcel. If you own more than one parcel, you may file a single protest, but it must identify each parcel you own. The protest must be signed by the property owner(s). If the signer(s) is not shown on the last equalized assessment roll of Monterey County as the owner(s) of the property, the signer(s) must provide written evidence of ownership of said property. At the hearing, the Board of Directors shall hear all protests and tabulate the ballots.

NOTICE OF PROPOSED RATE RESTRUCTURING AND INCREASE IN WATER RATES AND CHARGES

Dear Customer:

Glendale Water & Power (GWP) is proposing new rates and charges for its water utility. This notice explains the rate design and revenue adjustments that will be recommended to the Glendale City Council at the date, time, and location specified below.

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING

A public hearing for the proposed rate restructuring and increases will be held on Tuesday, January 31, 2012 at 6:00 p.m. at the City of Glendale Council Chambers, 613 E. Broadway, 2nd Floor.

WHY IS THERE A NEED FOR INCREASED REVENUE FOR THE WATER UTILITY?

In recent years, GWP has depleted cash reserves to pay for the costs and expenses to operate the water utility. The costs incurred by GWP to operate, maintain, repair and replace infrastructure such as pipes, pumps and other essential facilities continue to increase. The increases associated with GWP's expenses include the increased cost of purchased water, regulatory compliance, water treatment, outside services, material, and energy costs for ground water pumping. The proposed water rates will ensure that the water utility collects sufficient revenue to cover fixed expenses, fund capital improvements through revenue bonding, and build up cash reserves to fund ongoing repair and replacement of the water system in future years to maintain reliable service.

Like many other Southern California utilities, Glendale supplements local water resources with water purchased from the Metropolitan Water District (MWD). The cost of MWD continues to increase. In 2009, due to the higher price for water and the MWD reduced supplies, Glendale was faced with the challenge of asking customers to lower their use, thus lowering sales, while continuing to manage costs, address infrastructure needs, and maintain financial stability. Although Glendale is no longer under mandatory water conservation, it's not expected or recommended for customers to use water inefficiently. While California is still faced with inadequate regional water supplies and GWP continues to purchase a portion of its overall water needs from MWD, a new rate design has been developed to reflect the customers' current and projected water demand and to fund the utility's expenses.

The proposed rates and charges are calculated based on the cost to provide service to the area. Required revenue is based on projected expenses for operations, maintenance, and required repairs and/or replacement. Projected income is based on past volumetric sales, distinguishing income derived from Fixed Charges and Commodity Charges. The fixed monthly service charge recovers fixed costs of providing water services, which are allocated based on number of accounts and the size of a customer's water meter. The commodity charge recovers variable costs of providing water service, including the cost of ground water production, direct and indirect costs of purchased water from MWD, and costs associated with the delivery of water which are allocated based on the demand (amount of base & peak usage) that each customer class places on the water utility. In order for GWP to continue providing efficient and high quality water service to its customers, the proposed restructured rates will enable it to collect revenue for the expenses of the operation of the water utility. The proposed revenue increase will be 2% for the first year, 2% for the second year, 4% for the third year, and 5% for the fourth year.

WHY IS THE RATE STRUCTURE CHANGING?

In an effort to innovate rates and promote efficient use of water, the City Council has encouraged and requested that GWP design a new rate structure that is cost-based and accomplishes the goal of water efficiency. The proposed rate structure accomplishes this goal as the new single-family rate structure encourages conservation through appropriate price signaling.

HOW IS THE NEW RATE DESIGN DIFFERENT?

The existing single class rate structure was expanded to four distinct customer classes (Single-Family, Multi-Family, Commercial, and Irrigation). Based on a detailed multi-year consumption analysis and detailing of billing records, accounts were grouped based on user classification and peaking factor to create an appropriate and equitable rate design. The total cost of serving each customer class is determined by distributing each of the utility cost components among the user classes based upon the respective service requirements of each customer class. As such, a cost of service rate study enables a water utility to proportionately allocate cost to each customer class and adopt rates that equitably recovers those costs from the accounts within the respective customer class. For single-family customers, the rate redesign changes the existing two-tiered rate structure to one with five-tiers, which reflects the increased cost of providing service as customers consume a greater amount of water. For multi-family customers, the rate redesign provides three tiers, and for commercial and irrigation customers, there is a single tier.

HOW DOES THIS AFFECT MY WATER BILL?

As an example, the average monthly consumption for single-family residential customers in Glendale is approximately 19 Hundred Cubic Feet (hcf) at the cost of \$63.78. The proposed revenue adjustment with the rate redesign will result in a \$4.13 decrease in the monthly bill of a single-family residence that uses 19 hcf for the remainder of Fiscal Year 2011-2012. A single-family customer that consumes the Glendale average (19hcf) would be charged as follows:

The Marina Coast Water District (MCWD) proposes to update the water and wastewater rates, fees and charges in order to be able to continue to operate, maintain and improve the District's water and wastewater facilities for the areas MCWD serves in Marina and on the former Fort Ord. The area the District serves on the former Ft. Ord is known as the "Ord Community Service Area." Except as changed by these updates, other existing rates, fees and charges will remain in effect. Changes to rates, fees and charges for the Ord Community Service Area require approval by both MCWD and the Fort Ord Reuse Authority (FORA).

PROPOSED INCREASE FOR WATER AND WASTEWATER RATES. The District currently charges customers a monthly fee for water based on the amount of the water consumed. The monthly consumption rate is currently an inclining block with three tiers. The District currently charges a flat rate for wastewater services. The District proposes to increase water and wastewater rates as set forth herein.

PROPOSED INCREASE FOR WATER AND WASTEWATER SERVICE FEES. The District currently charges monthly service fees as a condition of service, based on the cost of labor and materials necessary to provide the services. The District proposes to increase water and wastewater service fees as set forth herein.

REASON FOR THE INCREASES. Since the last rate increase, the costs of energy, labor, raw materials and all other components necessary to provide water and wastewater services and to maintain and repair the facilities used to provide such services have increased. The proposed 7.8% for Marina and 7.8% for former Fort Ord increase is based information presented by engineering and financial advisors to the Boards of Directors of FORA and MCWD demonstrating the need to increase rates, fees and charges to maintain water and wastewater services within the MCWD's existing service areas. The specific information relating to the need for the rate increase as well as the calculation of the amount of the increase is on file at the MCWD's office.

HOW THE RATES, FEES AND CHARGES WERE CALCULATED. A study has been conducted by an independent consulting firm. That study concluded that the proposed rates will provide enough funds for the District to recover the cost of operation & maintenance and administration. All rates, fees and charges are calculated based on the cost to provide services. The water rates are calculated based on the amount of water used. Wastewater rates are calculated based on the amount of wastewater discharged, measured by equivalent dwelling units (one residence equals one dwelling unit).

PROTESTS TO PROPOSED CHARGES. If you are the owner of record of a parcel or parcels served by the MCWD or you are a tenant who makes payment directly to the MCWD for rates, fees and charges for water and wastewater services, you may submit a protest against the proposed rates, fees and charges by filing a written protest with the District at or before the time set for the public hearing. If written protests are presented by a majority of owners, including tenants who make direct payment to MCWD, MCWD and FORA will not impose the newrates, fees and charges. A protest must contain a description of the parcel or parcels in which the party signing the protest has an interest, sufficient to identify the parcel(s). If the party signing the protest is not shown on the last equalized assessment roll of Monterey County as the owner of the parcel(s), the protest must contain, or be accompanied by, written evidence that such party is the owner of the parcel(s) or is a tenant who makes payments directly to the MCWD for water and wastewater rates, fees and charges (a copy of recent MCWD bill would be sufficient evidence). Only one protest per property will be counted.
