Summary of Ordinance 156

Ordinance responds to Board's strategic goals to streamline and improve processes

- Amends 5 definitions
- Adds 2 definitions: "California Landscape Contractors Association" and "Meter Split"
 - Makes standard bathtubs and stall showers exchangeable without requiring a Water Permit
- Clarifies metering requirements for new users



Summary of Ordinance 156

Requires access to water records as a condition of a Water Permit condition

Implements policy of not charging for this deed restriction

- Increases the fixture unit value of 1.6 gpf toilets by 1/2 fixture unit
- Continues credit for High Efficiency Toilets (HET)
- Exempts HET credit from deed restriction requirement



Summary of Ordinance 156

Requires 8 (not 10) years of water records in certain credit calculations (due to unavailability of records)

- Adds Rebates for toilet flappers and replacement of 1.6 gpf toilets with HET
- Amends inspection requirement for Lawn and Cistern Rebates
- Amends Landscape Water Audits rule to add California Landscape Contractors Association



Environmental Review (CEQA)

- Initial Study and Notice of Intent to adopt Negative Declaration circulated
- No comments received
- Negative Declaration finding proposed:

Based on the Initial Study, the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District Board of Directors finds that adoption of Ordinance No. 156, the "2013 Water Permit and Conservation Programs Amendment and Clarification Ordinance," does not have a significant effect on the environment.
